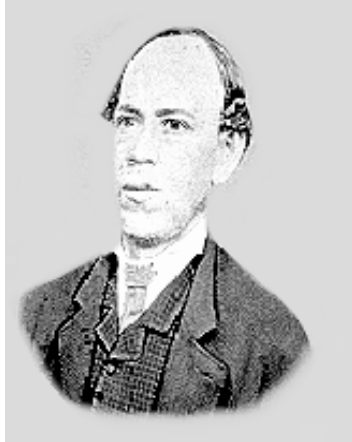

1st Generation, Dean Family¹

(1-D) **Robert DEAN** was born on 24 Apr 1830 in Kent County, Delaware. He died on 30 Sep 1874 in Delaware. He was buried at Manship Church Cemetery, Cheswold, Kent, Delaware. His grave marker is engraved with his age at death, 44-5-6 (years-months-days). He married **Catharine MORGAN** on 27 Feb 1851 in Kent County, Delaware. She was born on 27 Dec 1833 in Kent County, Delaware, the daughter of **John MORGAN**. She remarried, after Robert's death, to **William A. CARNEY**. She died on 23 May 1894 at Brenford, Kent County, Delaware. She was buried at Manship Church Cemetery, Cheswold, Kent, Delaware, next to **Robert DEAN**.

The parents of Robert Dean and Catharine Morgan Dean are unknown. However, **Jesse DEAN**, born about 1808 (Manship Church Cemetery grave marker: died 1868 in 61st year), is buried next to (1-D) Robert Dean. Jesse may be Robert Dean's father. In addition to the site of interment, another mention of Jesse Dean occurs in the Orphans' Court file of Robert Dean. The file contains an accounting of the sales of Robert Dean's estate assets:

May 17, 1875. "To this sum retained in hand by this accountant to pay to **Ellen Dean, granddaughter of Jesse Dean**: deceased, her share...pay to **Mary Dean, granddaughter of Jesse Dean**., deceased, her share....

¹Members of the first two generations of the Dean family are assigned a number and the letter D, thus the first person in the Dean family is (1-D) Robert Dean. The Mosley family members have been assigned a number and no letter: The first person therefore is (1) Wingate Mosley.

If the reference to Jesse Dean is accurate and not an error made by the person who wrote the accounting (writing “Jesse” when “Robert” was intended), it may refer to Jesse Dean: father to Robert Dean and father to another son who is the parent of Ellen and Mary.²

In addition, a will made by another Jesse Dean, dated 1839, mentions land he intends to leave to his sons Jesse and William and daughter Sally Ann Cott, the wife of John Cott. An effort is underway to match this land with that possessed by Robert Dean. A match would likely mean there was a family connection between Jesse Dean who made the will in 1839 and through either his son Jesse or his son William to Robert Dean.

There is in the Delaware Archives in Dover a birth record of a Louisa Catherine Morgan, born to Evans Morgan. No evidence has been found of a connection to Robert's family.

What is known of the life of the Robert Dean family is contained in the official lists and files compiled during their generation. Robert's marriage to Catharine Morgan is recorded in the marriage volumes at the Archives in Dover, but, unfortunately, without mention of their parents' names. They were born into the “Moorish” community in Kenton Hundred, Delaware.

From whence sprang the ancestors of the members of the group of people called the Moorish community has been lost in the mists of time. Late in the 1800's, perhaps because Cheswold was then named Moorton, a tradition arose, ascribing the origins of this people to a Moorish birthplace in north Africa, which would also account for their physical characteristics. The results of studies of the history of the residents of Cheswold (nee Moorton) and of related communities in southern Delaware, southern New Jersey and eastern shore Maryland have been disappointing. As with most triracial isolate groups³ in the United States, records were kept mainly in the Bibles and memories of individuals and rarely (and then only poorly) by governmental offices.

Excerpts of an interview with John Sanders of Cheswold, reported in the *Philadelphia Times*, 1892, follow. His story is the memory of one who lived in the area of Cheswold throughout the 1800's. (The full article, as well as others which purport to answer the questions about the origins of the Moors of Delaware, are in Appendix B.)

We are Indians, and we belong to a branch of the great Delaware Nation, which used to hold all the country from New York to Cape Charles. Down in Sussex county, on the backbone ridge of the Peninsula, the head waters of two rivers rise close together—one of them, the Nanticoke River, flows west into Chesapeake Bay, and Indian River, the other, flows east and empties into the ocean; and it was at the place where these two rivers rise that our clan had its chief seat, and it is still the centre for our people.

In time they adopted the names of their white neighbors, and the principal names in our tribe now are Harmon, Norwood, Sanders, Street, Ridgway, Jackson, Mosely, Durham and Hughes--all unmistakably of English derivation. They settled all over the country in squads in the same way. You can find them almost anywhere if you know how to look for them, and in Accomac and Northampton counties, Va., at the extreme lower end of the Peninsula, there are any number of them. And down there they have kept more to themselves than they have elsewhere, and they look and live more like the Indians did when I was a boy. I am 80 years old, and I can remember a good way back.

I was born in 1811, not two miles from here. My father, while a boy, was bound out to a man named Jefferson, who brought him up here from Sussex, so that I claim kindred with the old families down there. He settled here and lived here all his life; so did I...

My father and mother and all my foreparents were Indians. There are not many of the pure blood about here now, though there used to be a great many. It is strange how people have forgotten about us. Sixty years ago (about 1832) everyone knew who and what we were; there never was any question about it...

I really don't know how we came to be called Moors. I have heard, though, that a good many years ago a family of genuine Moors settled somewhere in this part of the country, but I have never seen them, and never heard anything more about them. They certainly had no connection with our people, who are the ones usually known by that name. But if the story is true, the newcomers about here, whom I spoke of, may have got us confused with them, or attached their story to us. There are quite a number of families by the name of Moor or Moore living about here, and this village used to be called Moorton until a few years ago.

But the Moore families are mostly white people and none of them have ever been connected with us in any way, and I never heard whether the village was so named on their account or ours. Probably it was on theirs, for the settlement, the original one, is a pretty old one and have got its name long before we were ever called Moors, and while our descent was well known. In my young days we were called "planters." We belonged to the Delaware Tribe of Indians, but I don't know what was the name of our clan, probably nobody does now. But I know that our last chief was buried somewhere in the neighborhood of Millsborough, in Sussex County...

After the birth of their first child, Mary Ann, in 1854, Robert Dean began accumulating over 100 acres of farmland in Kent County, Delaware. His purchases of land are recorded in the Grantee (buyers) Deed Libers, at the Delaware Archives, and are as follows:

1. 1857. Liber N, Vol. 4, page not yet discovered.
2. 1867. Liber C, Vol. 5, page 375, 29 1/2 acres.
3. 1868. Liber F, Vol. 5, page 273, 13 acres +.
4. 1872. Liber L, Vol. 5, page 35, 25 acres.
5. 1873. Liber P, Vol. 5, page 53.

Yet to be inspected are the Grantor (seller) indexes at the Delaware Archives. Additionally, Jesse Dean's land transactions have not yet been recorded. Jesse may be the name of both Robert's father and grandfather.

After his death, Robert Dean's estate was handled by the Kent County Orphans' Court (Delaware State Archives, Dover). He died without a will and had minor children. By state law, guardians had to be appointed to protect the children's interest in their father's estate. A description of his estate and inheritors thereof, follows:

Orphans' Court file of Robert Dean:

"at the time of his death seised⁴ in his demesne as of fee, of and in the following described lands and tenements to wit:

- No. 1, 30 acres in Kenton Hundred near Eben Cloak's land.
- No. 2, 30 acres in Kenton Hundred near Surgen & Cloak's land.
- No. 3, 25 acres in Kenton Hundred near Eben Cloak's land.
- No. 4, 9 acres in Kenton Hundred near Salmons and Cloak's land,
- No. 5, 7 acres on the road from Dover to Smyrna.

Petition of Moses Coker and Mary Ann his wife For assignment of Dower and partition of the Residue:

"Robert Dean (colored)⁵ late of Kenton Hundred...departed this life intestate...30 Sep 1874.... That the said deceased left to survive him a widow named Catharine (who has since married, and is now the wife of William A. Carney), and nine children, To Wit, Mary Ann Coker, one of your petitioners, John T. Dean; Lucinda, wife of William Johnson; Jesse Dean; Robert Dean; William Dean; Hester Dean; Annie Dean; and Ulysses G. Dean, as his only heirs at law: That...Lucinda Johnson, has since...Departed this life intestate, leaving to survive her, her said husband William Johnson and a daughter Mary, an infant, who has also died...leaving to survive her, her...father William Johnson.... That...all are minors, except your Petitioner Mary Ann Coker and the said William Johnson."

Robert Dean was a man of wealth compared to the typical farmer of his day. He owned over 100 acres of land and considerable farm assets, as described in the court records. A list of the items sold at the auction of his goods is interesting because the smallest of assets was not overlooked and because Robert's widow, Catharine, had to bid for things she wanted to keep. She was the apparent beneficiary of an error made by the administrator, as underlined in the list on the next page. The bay horse she bought was listed at \$60.00, but the amount charged was put down as 60 CENTS.

Robert Dean's full name has not yet been confirmed. Robert is called *Robert B. Dean* in the death certificate of his son Jesse (information given by 2nd wife Susan). Robert had another son named Robert Burton Dean. Since no other record has been found which indicates a middle name or middle initial, we will assume his full name is ROBERT DEAN.

She was the daughter of **James SEANEY**. She is probably buried at Manship Church Cemetery, Cheswold, Delaware with her husband and child, Ernest.

(9) **Charles Henry MOSLEY** was born on 15 Nov 1861 in Kent County, Delaware. He died on 19 Oct 1906 at Cheswold, Kent, Delaware. He was buried at Manship Church Cemetery, Cheswold, Kent, Delaware. He married (9-D) **Anna Elizabeth "Annie" DEAN**, daughter of (1-D) **Robert and Catharine (MORGAN) DEAN**, on 4 Jan 1888. She was born on 30 Jan 1870 at Cheswold, Kent, Delaware. She died on 27 Jun 1963 at Cheswold, Kent, Delaware. He was buried on 30 Jun 1963 at Manship Church Cemetery, Cheswold, Kent, Delaware.

Memories of Charles H. Mosley have been passed down from his widow, Annie, to her grandchild, Grace Wilson Davis:

“Grandfather was a kind and gentle man and definitely head of the family and a good provider and farmer. He had 25 acres and had a variety of almost every tree and bush imaginable: red and white cherry, damson, peaches, apples, raspberries, black-berries, strawberries, and gooseberries. He raised wheat and corn and always had enough food to provide for the winter. He never had to buy anything.

“At Christmas, the table was set the night before and the children put pennies on their own dinner plate. Father got up with them at 3 a.m. and they checked their plates and found nuts, oranges and part or all of a toy.

“New Years no one could eat until a man entered the house to bring good luck. The first one to enter the house had to be a man, so father would hold a gun and Pearl always got to pull the trigger. That was the signal for Mr. Carney to come up to be first to enter the house.

“He died of typhoid fever and complications of pneumonia. His family was enveloped in typhoid as were others in that area at the time. Daughter Katie died two days after her father.”

Charles H. Mosley bought a farm with two transactions in Kenton Hundred, Kent, Delaware, 12 Sep 1892, from William S. Hardcastle and his wife, Mary, for \$1100. These are described in the deeds as follows:

No. 1. All that certain farm or tract of land situated in Kenton Hundred, Kent County and State of Delaware on the public road leading from the Seven Hickories to what is known as the Upper Mill, adjoining lands of William R. Smith, lands of James K. Morgan and Lot No. 2 hereinafter described and said to contain **twenty five acres** of land more or less.

No. 2. Also, all that certain lot, piece or parcel of land situated in the Hundred, County and State aforesaid, adjoining lands of James K. Morgan. and the farm above described as No. 1 and said to contain **one acre** of land more or less, and being the same lands and premises which were conveyed to the said William S. Hardcastle. by Minos Conaway as Administrator of William Morgan deceased by deed dated 22 Sep AD 1891 and recorded by the Recorders office at Dover in Deed Book G, Vol. 7, page 455.

As Grace Davis recalls, the Fall of 1906 turned out to be a terrible one for the Mosley family. Charles H. Mosley became desperately ill from typhoid fever, succumbing to it October 19th. His daughter Sarah Catharine Mosley Durham contracted typhoid and passed away October 21st. Sarah's husband, Wilbur W. Durham, held out awhile, finally giving up the ghost to the same illness on November 23rd. 1906 .

Charles H. Mosley's estate was handled by the Kent County Orphans' Court. He died without a will and had minor children. By state law, guardians had to be appointed to protect the children's interest in their father's estate. The inheritors are listed by the Court as follows:

"To Annie E. Mosley, widow, Bessie A. Mosley, Felix Mosley, Charles M. (*sic*) Mosley, Clifton Mosley, Edith P. Mosley, Bulah (*sic*) Mosley, Mabel Mosley, Mary E. Mosley, Annie J. Mosley & Reba D. Mosley, children and heirs-at-law and Charles M. Durham, grandchild, (son of Sarah Catharine Mosley, deceased) and to Annie E. Mosley tenant in possession, I intend to apply to the Orphans' Court...on Monday the tenth day of December next...for an ORDER to sell the...REAL ESTATE of Charles H. Mosley deceased, as will be necessary to settle the debts due...
Dover, Nov 9, 1906. (signed) Admin. Jesse Dean

There is no record of the guardians appointed, but there is a record of the disposition of the assets of the estate to pay outstanding debts (see the auction notice on page 18). Jesse Dean, who may be Anna Elizabeth Dean Mosley's brother, was appointed administrator of the estate. He put up the auction notice at about 10 locations around Kent County. Charles Mosley's farm equipment and household furniture were included in the sale.

As we saw on page 6 with Robert Dean's estate, the same rule of disbursement was applied to Charles H. Mosley's estate. In addition to personal assets, he owned about 30 acres of land near Seven Hickories. Again, the widow *had to bid for things she wanted to keep*. A surprise was that Annie E. Mosley *bid and won the right to buy the farm!*

The Administrator of the estate reported to the court:

“...I did on the twenty-sixth day of December last, at the front door of Coopers Store in town of Cheswold expose to sale, by way of public vendue, all the lands and premises described in the said order; and I did then and there at the said vendue sell the farm or tract of land and premises containing Twenty five acres of land more or less, unto **Annie E. Mosley** for the sum of Three Hundred and forty Dollars (\$340.00), she being at said sum the highest and best bidder for the same; and which said purchase money has been duly paid to me before making this return. All of which is respectfully submitted to the Court for approval.”

My Life Story by Grace G. Davis

On August 3, 1909 near Ridgely, Maryland, I was born to Howard Clifton Wilson and his wife Bessie Alice Mosley Wilson. I remember my parents and Grandmother Wilson telling me that the day I arrived it was very hot. My parents were living with my Grandparents, the Solomon Wilsons, on the Oakland Farm. My mother, I guess, was a little anxious for me to arrive. I was stubborn even then so she asked my Grandmother could they go over to visit Aunt Elmira. After lunch (dinner) they drove over to Aunt Elmira's and in midafternoon Mother started in labor and quickly they went home, called the midwife and near evening I was born.

My poor Grandmother was a tiny lady and she was very nervous because my Grandfather said "Augusta," very sharply, "you should have known better than to go off with Bessie. That child could have been born on the road in the carriage." Everyone was so nervous but when it was all over they could and did look back with joy when I was their darling daughter, just what they had hoped for.

As I grew older I found out that I had an older brother, Charles Edward, and a younger one, Howard Clifton. We grew up to be typical country brothers and sister. My parents would tell my brothers, "Now this is your only sister and you should treat her nice," and I grew older thinking they should come to my every call (a mess, in other words) but we dearly loved each other--at times--and other times fight and tease, cry a bit. I can remember crying at the drop of a hat.

My first ten years were spent on farms near Ridgely, Maryland. My father each spring would have migrant workers come from Roanoke, Va., to pick strawberries and they lived in what my parents called shanties and in our home I remember my folks had a small store house of supplies, like groceries, and even candy my mother would sell to the workers. I can remember those wooden buckets of lard, salted mackerels, sugar, flour, hard candy and gum pieces. After strawberry season was over it was wheat, corn and tomatoes to be cultivated and harvested.

My mother was a very wonderful person, one that loved others and worked too hard and loved her family. They would take us to church and almost every Sunday we would go home with Grandmother for dinner. Grandfather Wilson was a delightful man in a nine-year-olds mind. He would be sitting in his rocking chair at the side of the kitchen stove near a window and his spittoon or cuspidor where he spit his tobacco juice into. Terrible now that I look back, but this was in the early 1900s. Times were different. Grandmother's hot biscuits with her homemade jellies and jam was so good. She would have the best dinners. We would ride like this in a horse

and carriage and take turns in our places in the middle and the other two in the bottom of the carriage. The horse's tail would give us a switch ever so often but we didn't mind because we loved going to church and to be able to go to Grandmother's.

Grandmother Wilson was a very sweet person, very thin and about 5 feet 6 inches in height, had white hair, wore about four petticoats, the long hoop type, all the way to the floor and ruffle on top of ruffle. My Grandfather was about the same height but more on the stouter side, wore sideburns and whiskers on his chin. We adored him and I'm sure there were times he could have sent us home asailing. I can remember him getting very ill and my parents would go every day. Finally my mother would stay all night there and in a few days Grandfather died from a kidney something. His funeral was my first to ever attend. It was held in their home and I'll never forget it, this huge casket and my Grandfather laying there as if he were asleep.

Death meant very little to me then, but I can remember these beautiful horses that carried my Grandfather's body to the cemetery and soon after my Grandmother sold the home place near Greensboro, Maryland and came to live with us near Ridgely. She loved my mother and said she was like a real daughter.

Then I can remember mother would bring us up by train to visit my other Grandmother Mosley and my first remembrance of her was she was really a big stately lady whom was the average tall woman and weighed about 200 lbs. or more. She had a big, big bust, could sit and lay her hands to rest on her bust. I'm sure they weren't as big as they looked to me but I can remember her asking mother to have us with them for a while but my mother would stay a few days and return home, happy to be back home to Dad in Maryland. Charlie my older brother would cry to go back to Grandmother's and one time they let him go and he said Aunt Mary, Aunt Jeannette, Aunt Reba and Uncle Milton did all sorts of things with him and for him, he loved this.

One time I can remember Dad taking me to visit his sister, my Aunt Elmira Dean whom now lived in Bears, Delaware, near Wilmington, and Uncle Bob Dean met us and this was a trip I never forgot. Also one morning cousin Walter Mosley owned a car, he came over and took my Dad and me over in Delaware to get some crates of strawberries, we hit a hole in the road and I went off the back seat into the floor but I was so happy to be along that this didn't even hurt.

Along about this time World War I was in action. President Woodrow Wilson was our president and one afternoon we were out in the tomato field picking tomatoes when my two older cousins came over in the field to tell Mother and Dad that they would be leaving for Camp Meade, Maryland, and on into the service. I can remember my Mother putting her arms around them, telling them things to be careful of and how much we would miss them and would look for their return. By the way, I don't think there is much truth to the story that old Woodie, as we called the President downhome, was Solomon Wilson's illegitimate child.

The winter before this my Uncle Cliff had died and Mother went to his funeral in a snow storm (a blizzard) and when she arrived at Clayton, Delaware, no one could get there to meet her, the roads were closed to snow drifts and etc. She walked from the Kenton Station to

Grandmother's house which was about 2 1/2 to 3 miles. My Grandfather Mosley had passed a year or so before he and Aunt Katie had typhoid fever and died, and now Uncle Cliff. My mother returned home with pneumonia and the next fall when the flu epidemic went through she came down with the flu and this developed into TB and in those years the doctors were not aware of how to take care of this so in the spring of 1919 my mother would take with these horrible chills at night and morning. She was in the bed more than out but there were we three children to take care of and she did the best she could.

My Grandmother Wilson was living with us and my Grandmother Mosley would come for a few days, Aunt Jeannette would come and help. My Father was so upset, I can remember him asking mother is there anything you want or what can I do, mother was of a gentle nature and everything was fine she would say. She did ask Dad to buy an organ for me to take music lessons on, which he did buy a brand new organ, and I know he couldn't afford this, and on August 3, 1919 my Mother had planned a birthday party for me, it was my 10th birthday. She had 3 or 4 of my girl friends in and I can remember one present I got was a plate with animals on it, hair ribbons and we had cake or cookies and something to drink.

Each evening and day my Mother grew weaker and weaker and she would always be hot, wanted the doors open so she could get the fresh air, and chills that would seem to shake her through and through. We would pile on more blankets until the chill would pass over. On the 13th day of August, 1919, my Mother called us children into her bedside and talked to each of us as individuals, Charlie being first, he was to go and live with Uncle Milton and Aunt Mae because he loved Uncle Milton so much plus they had no children of their own and she knew he would be taken good care of.

I was next to go in and she hugged me very tightly and said Grace my darling daughter, I want you to be a good girl, take care of your father and I want you to go to Delaware and live with Aunt Mary and Uncle Tommie because I'm going home to my Father's House to live. I promised her I would do whatever she wanted me to but little did I realize what going home to live with her Father meant. Next in line was my younger brother Howard Clifton, Jr. whom she adored and he being the youngest she wanted him to go with Grandmother Mosley to live and what else she said to him I do not know but I do know that afternoon and evening the doctor came, her relatives and Mother slipped quietly away. But I can never forget her, nor do I want to.

Being ten years old, her death was like a dream. For Mother this must have been sad to leave her three children and a wonderful husband, but we all realize our Heavenly Father knew best.

Lucille was named "Kathryn" after her godmother, Kathryn White. She attended Cheney State in Pennsylvania, receiving a BS in Education in ----- . After graduation she learned of a position available in North Carolina at an educational center (grammar and high schools), founded by the famous George Eastman of Kodak fame. A teacherage (living accommodations) came with the job, which, according to Lorraine, made it sound "soooo" attractive. She accepted a position from afar and traveled to Enfield, Halifax County, NC to teach the upper grades. She found a couple of clapboard houses, no water and chamber pots.

It was too late to turn back--she had spent all the money allocated for travel on a one-way train ticket. She found that the male teachers lived downstairs and the ladies above. The shy lady teachers would put their chamber pots on a pillow so the men downstairs wouldn't hear.

Lorraine, suffered terribly from an auto accident she was involved in near Richmond, Va. at age 21. She received a fractured skull and other injuries to her right side. She was unconscious for a month. When she awoke in the Hospital, she could speak only the French she had studied for 3 years in High School!

Aaron Bass was a private pilot prior to WW II, flying Piper Cub-type light aircraft. His father was an electrical worker, influencing his son in choice of career. Aaron was trained at Tuskegee Institute, Tuskegee, Alabama and was a member of ROTC there. During World War II, he was called to active duty. The usual expectation for a college-trained person was a commission to Lieutenant at the end of basic training. But Fort Benning, Ga., at that time, had too many ROTC graduates for the limited number of slots available to colored men. He had had a hint of what was to come and attempted to enlist in the Air Force before a decision was made about his commission. The Army shipped him to Texas a week prior to his interview with the Air Force. He was told the Army did him a "favor" by giving him Corporal's stripes, telling him to be happy as he wouldn't have any KP duties to perform!

Aaron retired after working as an aeronautical electrical engineer with U.S. Naval Air Development Center, Warminster, Bucks County, Pa. He specialized in aeronautical electronics, research and development, with emphasis on stress levels on electronics systems in Naval aircraft. After spending 36 years with the Navy, 26 of it in the environmental lab, which he headed, he became a troubleshooter for private industry.
